#### **Apprentice of The Month**

The honours for the final Apprentice of the Month for last season went to Alex Dyer of Northampton Town.

Alex signed his first professional contract in November after an impressive opening to the campaign. Following his first team debut in the Carling Cup against Premier League side Middlesbrough, he made a number of league appearances and opened his account for the Cobblers in a 2 -1 victory over Luton Town in April.

As well as his success on the pitch, Alex is well on his way to completing his Apprenticeship, having demonstrated an excellent attitude to the education throughout the two years and is set to achieve a full framework.

The 17-year-old midfielder was also awarded the Northampton Town Young Player of the Year award for 2007-08 at the Club's end of season sponsor's dinner.

The Apprentice of the Month awards will re-start in September 2008.

Huddersfield Town striker Daniel Broadbent has undoubtedly made a positive impression after 10 years with the Terriers.



Joining the Club as an eight year old, Daniel has represented the club at every level and made his bow in the Town first team as a second year Apprentice last term.

The former England U16 international caught the eye with a string of impressive performances at Youth and Reserve level and his remarkable season was capped when he was named as the League One Apprentice of the Year at The Football League Awards emulating Terriers team-mates Joe Skarz who picked up the gong in the 2006 – 07 season.


The Apprentice Awards reflect not only excellence on the pitch but also academic aptitude and hard work and it was just reward that his efforts were recognised by an expert panel of judges. On winning the award 18-year-old Daniel said: "I still can't believe it. This award is a great reflection on the Club and the Youth Development system that is in place. It is the second year running that a player from Huddersfield has won it and I am very proud."

After making his league debut against Tranmere Rovers last October the young striker has made excellent progress and has worked diligently to successfully complete the academic elements of his Apprenticeship. As a first year Professional next season Daniel will be aiming to impress boss Stan Ternent and further enhance his growing reputation.

LFE's Pat Lally has watched Daniel mature over the last two seasons and believes he has all the attributes to do just that: "Danny is a very likeable young man who always endeavours to get the best out of himself in everything he does whatever the situation or circumstance.

He has a positive and determined attitude that has served him well on the field and educationally and should continue to serve him well.

He's a great role model to his peers both on and off the pitch and I cant speak highly enough of him."



Have you ever wondered why there are not more black and ethnic players involved in Football Coaching or Management?



#### Equality of opportunity within coaching.



Among footballers in this country, there is a successful mix of cultures. PFA statistics

show that 25 per cent of our footballers are of ethnic origin. However, figures show that less than 1% of Managers and Senior Coaches are of ethnic origin.

I am currently working hard alongside my colleagues at the PFA to increase awareness of this issue and to facilitate a training and development programme for coaches from ethnic minorities. Having already lost one generation of potential coaches, we are determined to help redress the balance by not losing the next.

I have gone through the Player/ Coach/Coach-Educator route, so I now spend four days per week as the PFA Regional Coach in the South East Region delivering the Level 2 Certificate in Coaching Football to Apprentices at Football clubs.

Working with Apprentices is an interesting and challenging aspect of my role. To encourage Apprentices to take their level 2 qualification at such an early stage of their career and for them to see the value and worth of the coaching award is very rewarding.

By imparting my knowledge and Football experiences to Apprentices I am able to show them how useful the coaching qualification can be in furthering their understanding and PFA statistics show that 25% of our footballers are of ethnic origin. knowledge of the game. Seeing so many young players now achieve this qualification gives me a great deal of satisfaction.

Last season was again very successful with Crystal Palace, MK Dons, Millwall, Northampton, QPR, Rushden & Diamonds, and Watford all gaining very good results on the L2 CCF award. From a personal and professional point of view it's good to see so many Apprentices from ethnic minorities completing the coaching award successfully.

I consider it a privilege to be involved in this area as there is so much work to be done in ensuring that everyone is afforded the same equality of opportunity and I hope that I can be a role model for young aspiring coaches.



# Progression 2008 kicks off in style

"Progression" is the name given to LFE's support programme for Apprentices in Professional Football looking at alternative or secondary careers following their Apprenticeship programme.

While ASE is designed to give Apprentices the very best chance of building and maintaining a career as a professional footballer, research has shown that around 60% of Apprentices will not be offered a Professional contract at the end of

their Apprenticeship. Through Progression LFE aims to equip Apprentices with the information and skills necessary for alternative and secondary careers.

Last spring saw LFE's Progression programme hit top gear, with Progression "The Careers Event" being staged at the City of Manchester Stadium. Run in association with the The Professional Footballers Association and The Football League and supported by Puma, The Careers Event attracted close to 400 Apprentices who were able to engage with some of the UK's leading employers and education & training institutions. These include Carphone Warehouse, Fitness

First, Leeds Met Carnegie, Marks & Spencer, The Open University, The Royal Marines and Staffordshire University.

Endorsed by Puma the event also attracted England Star David Bentley who mixed with Apprentices and offered words of encouragement to many. Bentley who was once an Apprentice at Arsenal said: 'It's very humbling and reminds me how lucky I am. A lot of players I played with didn't make it and that's the harsh reality, but you can't just throw people on the scrap heap with their dreams.'

Following on from the hugely successful 'Careers Event' at the City of Manchester Stadium in March, Progression stepped up a gear as the Assessment Trials were held at The Ricoh Arena, Griffin Park and Valley Parade in May.

Leading in to the Assessment Trials demand was such that an extra match at both the Midlands and Northern Venue had to be arranged to accommodate the vast number of players seeking to participate in the showcase events.

The three events provided a total of 231 players with a platform to highlight their talents in front of 120 representatives from Premier League, Football League & Non League Clubs and Further and Higher Education Institutions from the UK and abroad.

Hailed by Players and Scouts alike the trials clearly illustrate the work that LFE is conducting to provide players with further opportunities both on and off the pitch following their Apprenticeship.

LFE would like to extend its thanks to all the Players, Parents, Club Representatives/Scouts and staff at each venue for their assistance in ensuring that the trials were run in a professional manner.

George Foster Academy Manager at Stoke City added: "The trials are unlike any I've attended previously and have been excellently organised from start to finish. A huge amount of credit must go to LFE for arranging events that offer the right environment in which to view players. The games have highlighted just how much talent there is out there and with some really skilful and good technical players on show."


