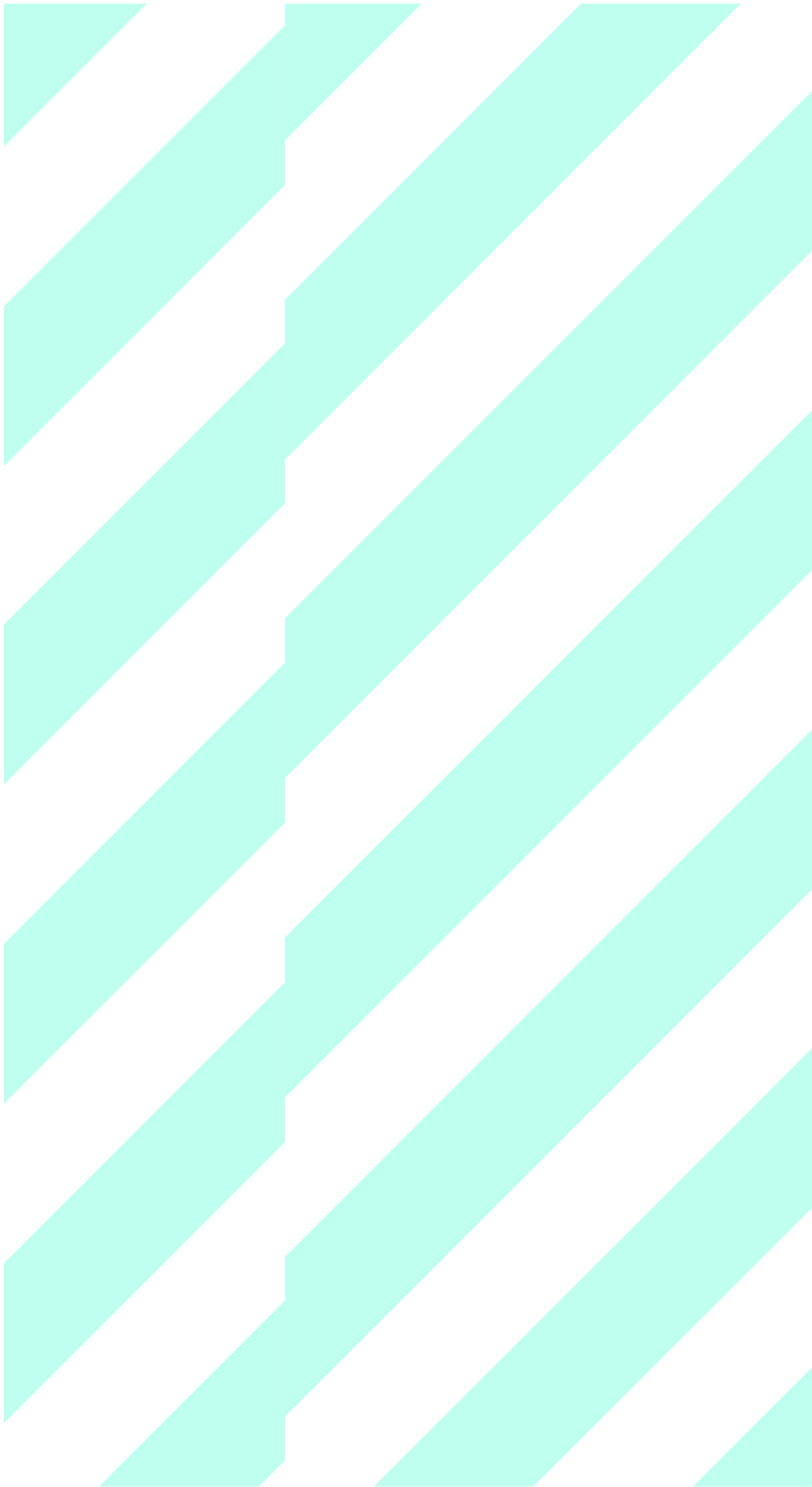

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Applying for Higher Education

Thinking about studying for a degree?

You may now be starting to think for the first time about developing yourself as more than a footballer. This process in itself is quite daunting but if you are thinking of or considering going to university and making the step into Higher Education, it is important to explore how your studies may fit into your long term personal development and career aims.

Before deciding what degree you are going to study you will also need to check university admissions requirements for the subject or subjects of your choice.

It may be that you need to undertake additional qualifications following your Apprenticeship to secure a place on the course of your choice.

There are a number of reasons why people decide to study for a degree. For some people it is an essential part of professional training for a career in fields such as medicine, engineering and law. Others may have no clearly defined career destination in mind but are motivated by their interest in a particular subject and a desire to improve themselves as people alongside their future career prospects.

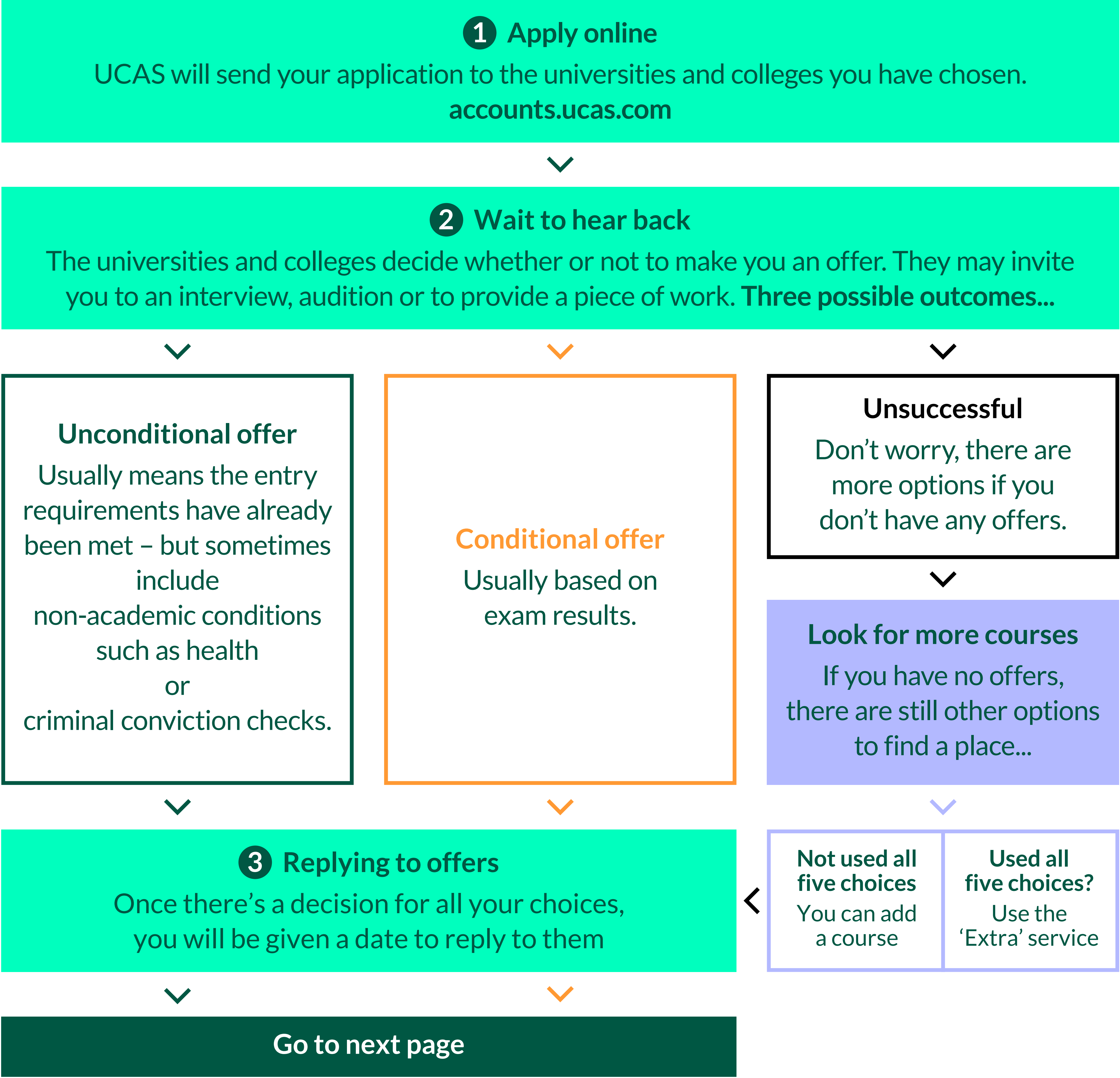

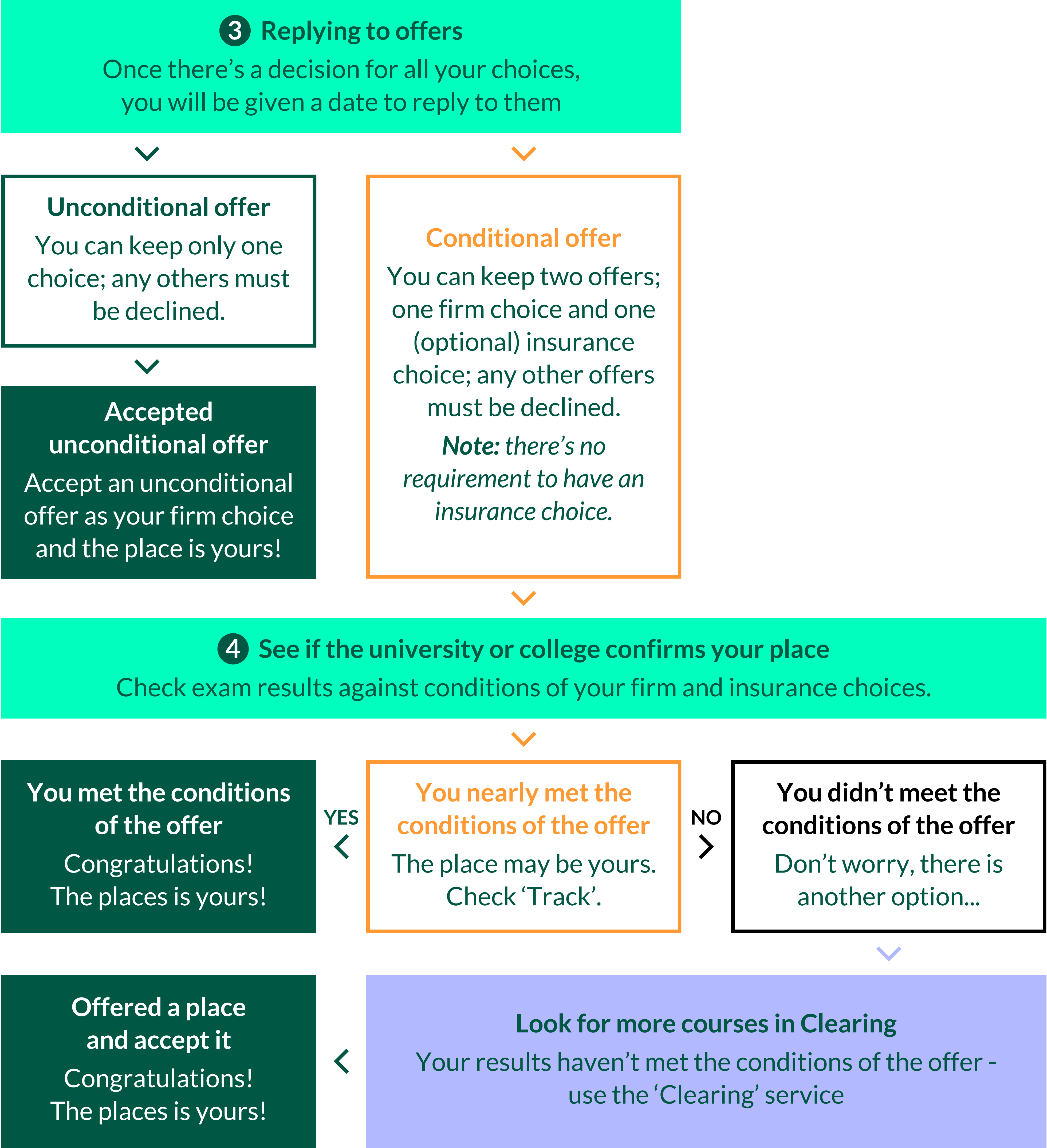

Applying for Higher Education

Applying Online

Register

Register for UCAS at www.ucas.com/apply and complete the online application form. Provide the required personal details to receive a username and password.

You should manually type 'League Football Education' as your place of education because it will not be listed and you can tick the box to confirm this.

You will not require a buzzword because you will apply to UCAS with an independent application, please note this will not affect your application.

Log in

Log in to complete filling in information about yourself such as funding options, residential status, any disabilities or special needs and your email address.

Additional information

You can now provide details of your ethnic origin, national identity, any summer schools/taster courses you attended, care and parental education and occupational background.

Student finance

This is not your student finance application but it is an opportunity to speed up the process by sharing your information with the student loans or awards organisation you may apply to.

Course choices

Now you can choose up to five degree courses, there is no preference order and your universities will not see where else you have applied until after you reply to any offers you receive.

Educational history

You should enter all of the qualifications you have a result for (this includes any which were ungraded) as well as any exams you are waiting to take and any qualifications for which you are waiting results.

If you are undertaking an additional A Level, you must add this on to your application as a part time course.

You may need to send results onto universities directly once you have received them so be sure to check this once you have made your course choices. You should manually type 'League Football Education' as your place of education and click 'Add' because it will not prepopulate.

You will then be asked for League Football Education's centre number, which is **45539**. Finally, when asked whether you are in full time or part time education, select the 'full time education' option.

Employment history

Enter the details of up to five paid full-time or part-time jobs you have had. Include company names, addresses, job descriptions and start/finish dates. Any voluntary work should be mentioned in your personal statement.

Personal statement

This is your chance to show universities why you want to study the course and why you'd make a great student.

Check it

Double check all sections are accurate and correct then mark your application as complete. Save it and agree to the declaration.

Reference and payment

Single application fee is no longer an option. All applications for undergraduate courses will be £27.50.

If you are resitting any Maths or English, make sure you put 'pending' as the result, as you may not have sat this exam yet, and you do not want the grade to potentially go against you.

It would be advisable for tutors to check over students' applications before they submit.

Submitting your application

It is your responsibility to manage each section of your application, however you do have access to guidance from your tutor, club's education or player care officer and LFE. Once you are confident that you have completed your application and have no further information to provide, you will be able to submit your application.

Superstar Student

After being released by Stevenage in 2015, **Fejiri Okenabirhie** pursued an Open University degree in Business & Management to aid his attempts to rise back up the leagues.



Since then, he has climbed from the seventh tier of English football to Sky Bet League One with Cambridge United.

"Education gives you something to fall back on in terms of giving you knowledge and opportunities for life after football, but it can also be beneficial in the present, not just your future."

"As well as obvious transferable skills like self-motivation and time management, it keeps you sharp mentally and gives you something to focus on away from football. It's a way to relax your mind from those pressures, but also provides stimulation as you're learning new information."

BUCS and The PFA

BUCS

British Universities & Colleges Sport (BUCS) is the national governing body for Higher Education (HE) sport in the UK. If you are keen to compete at the highest level of university football then choosing an institution attached to a good level of the BUCS competition is something you may wish to consider.

PFA Courses

The PFA currently supports the following courses for all current and former members of The PFA:

- BSc (Hons) Sport: Coaching and Development at Manchester Metropolitan University
- BSc (Hons) Sport Science at Manchester Metropolitan University
- BSc (Hons) Physiotherapy at the University of Salford
- BA (Hons) Sports Writing and Broadcasting at Staffordshire University
- BSc (Hons) Physiotherapy at York St John University

These courses are subject to review and only run if adequate numbers of students register. The times and mode of study is tailored to be as flexible as possible to fit in with the lifestyle of a professional footballer, (with the exception of the York St John course which is a three-year full-time programme aimed at ex-players).

These courses are partly subsidised by The PFA, although a contribution may also be required from each student towards tuition costs for each year.

You may be able to access these courses without applying through UCAS. If you are interested in any of the programmes mentioned, please ensure that you contact Pat Lally (Director of Education) or Oshor Williams (Assistant Director of Education) at PFA Education.

What happens to your application?

What UCAS do with your Application

UCAS use the information you have provided on the online application system, and send your application details to each of the universities and colleges that you have selected.

Track

Track is the online system you need to use to monitor the progress of your application.

Log into the UCAS website with your Personal ID to understand what stage your application is at.

You may be asked to provide additional pieces of work or receive an interview invitation, you will need to respond accordingly and timely.

If you are offered a place...

You will receive an email when a university makes a decision, you will need to use UCAS 'Track' to view the full details.

The two types of offers are:

Conditional – a place is reserved for you providing you meet the conditions, these are normally academic grades.

Unconditional – you have already met all the required conditions so the place is offered pending criminal record and health checks.

If you get two or more offers, you can select a 'Firm Acceptance' (first) choice and an 'Insurance Acceptance' (second choice) and then 'Decline' any other offers.

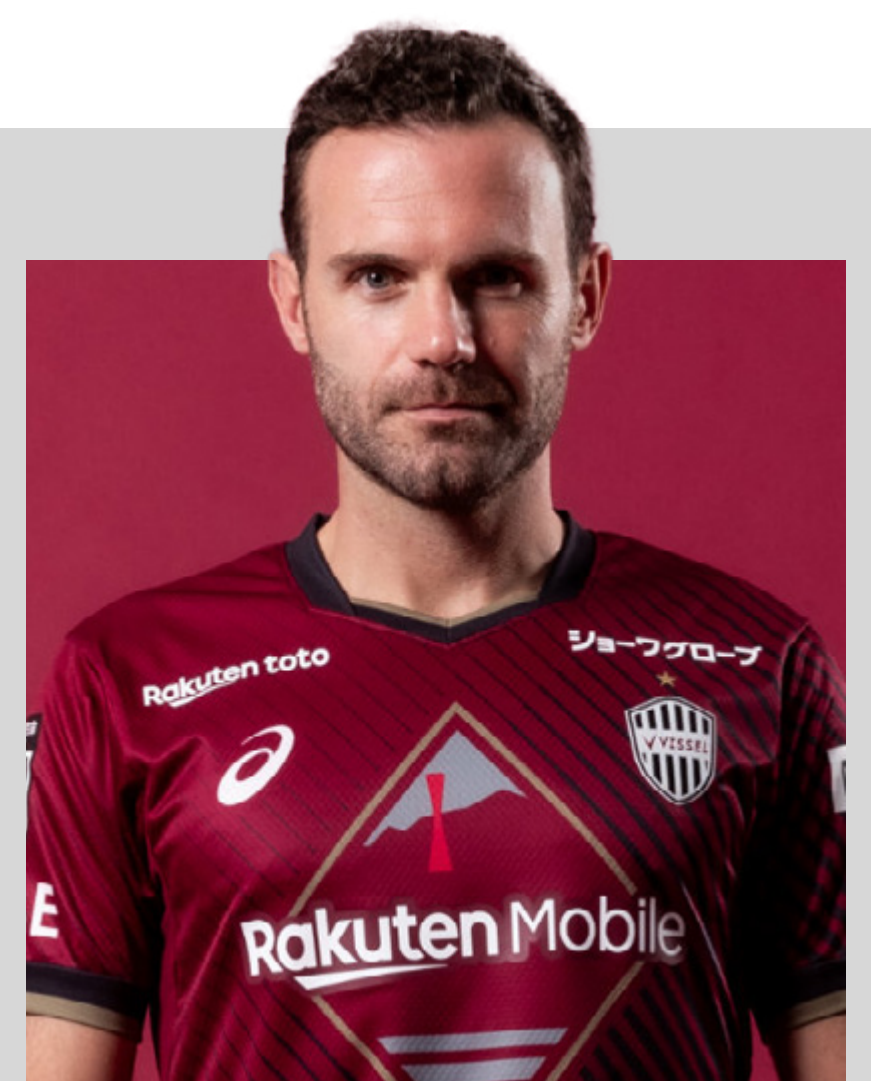
Your deadline for making such decisions depends on when your last offer was received.

If you are not offered a place...

Do not worry if no offers are received, you could apply for more courses using the 'Extra' service. See page 15 for more details.

What happens to your application?

Extra

If you are unsuccessful in receiving an offer from all of your five choices or have declined all of your offers then you can use the 'Extra' service.

Extra allows you to apply to universities with place vacancies but you can only apply for one course at a time.

Extra operates from 23rd February to 4th July.

Search for courses with Extra vacancies on the UCAS search tool at digital.ucas.com/search

Clearing

Clearing is a UCAS service that helps you find course vacancies if you are unsuccessful after applying through UCAS and through Extra.

Clearing begins on 5th July but only starts placing students when exam results have been received.

You are eligible if you have received no offers or have not met the requirements for a conditional offer.

UCAS will automatically enter you into Clearing and you start looking for another choice by logging into Track.

If you accept a place through Clearing, UCAS will send you confirmation.

Financing University Life

Going to university costs a lot of money but that shouldn't stop you - there are lots of different options available to make it affordable and realistic.

Tuition Fees

Tuition fees are the amount universities or colleges will charge you each year to study. Currently tuition fees can cost up to £9,250 per year depending on where and what you study.

Student Loans

To cover the costs of studying you can apply for:

A Tuition Fee Loan – a non-income assessed loan to meet the cost of tuition fees. It is payable to the university in three instalments. Payment is made when confirmation is received from university or college that the student is in attendance at the start of each term. The amount of tuition charged is dependent on:

- the country of study and the set maximum tuition fees rate
- the fee set by the university for the chosen degree course

The maximum Tuition Fee Loan available will be the lesser of the above two.

All Tuition Fee Loans are repayable and accrue interest.

Student Loans (continued)

A Maintenance Loan – a loan that you can use for living costs if you are a full-time undergraduate student and those on initial teacher training courses. It comprises a:

- non-financially assessed portion, which all students who are eligible for the loan can receive
- financially assessed portion, which depends on household income

Here is a guide to maintenance loans:

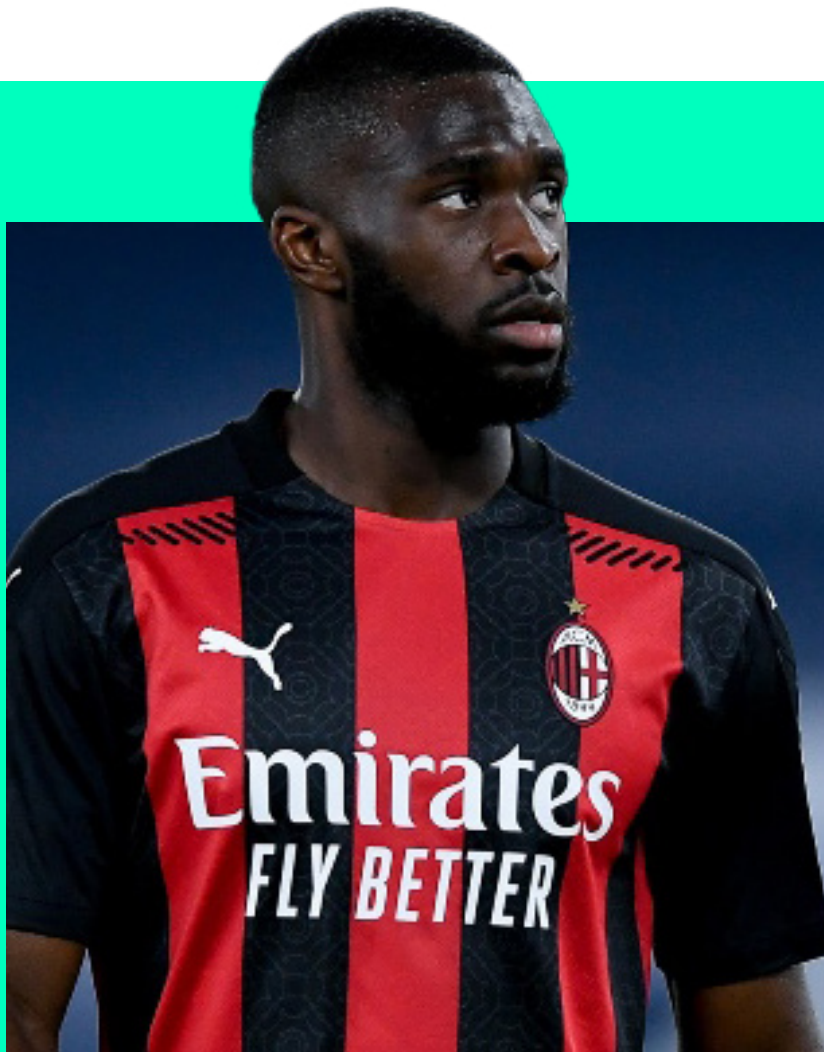

Loan Repayments

How much you pay back

Any LFE apprentices starting university after August 1st 2023 will be on repayment plan 5. Repayment plan 5 is a new repayment plan, being introduced for students starting undergraduate and Advanced Learner Loan courses on or after 1 August 2023. You won't be expected to make repayments to your plan 5 student loan until April 2026 at the earliest, even if you leave your course early.

You'll only start making repayments if your income is over the repayment threshold. The repayment threshold for the 2026-27 tax year will be £25,000 a year, £2,083 a month or £480 a week in the UK. If your income falls below the repayment threshold, your repayments will stop and only restart when your income is over the threshold again.

You'll repay 9% of your income over the repayment threshold, which is currently £25,000 a year, £2,083 a month or £480 a week in the UK. If your income changes, either rising or falling, your repayment amount will automatically change to reflect this.

|----------------------|--------------------|

| £33,000 | £60 |

Interest on your Student Loan

You pay interest from the time your first payment is made until you pay your loan back in full.

While you're studying, interest is inflation plus 3%.

However, From 1 June 2023 to 31 August 2023, the maximum Plan 2 and the PGL interest rate will be 7.1%, to take into account the most recent increase in the prevailing market rates. From 1 August 2023 the cap will also apply to Plan 5 (undergraduate) loans, which are being introduced for Academic Year 2023/24.

From 1 September 2023 the maximum Plan 2 and the PGL interest rate is scheduled to revert to RPI+3%, and the Plan 5 interest rate to RPI. Further caps will be implemented, if required, to reduce student loan interest rates to align with the prevailing market, and will be confirmed closer to the time.

Bursaries

Bursaries and scholarships offer extra funding that you don't have to pay back. This extra funding, which is available through universities includes:

- bursaries to help with your living cost if you get the maximum loan available through the Maintenance Grant or Special Support Grant
- scholarships if you meet conditions set by your university or college, based on your academic ability, home situation or subject of study. These scholarships differ from university to university. Many universities will offer scholarships or bursaries based purely on your sporting ability.

Bursaries and scholarships are paid in addition to your student loans and grants. They can be paid in cash or in another form - such as a discount on accommodation or books.

PFA Charity Grants

The PFA provide grant aid for a variety of courses to help all members and ex-members prepare for a second career. At the time of writing, members studying full time towards an undergraduate degree can apply for a bursary of £1250 each year.

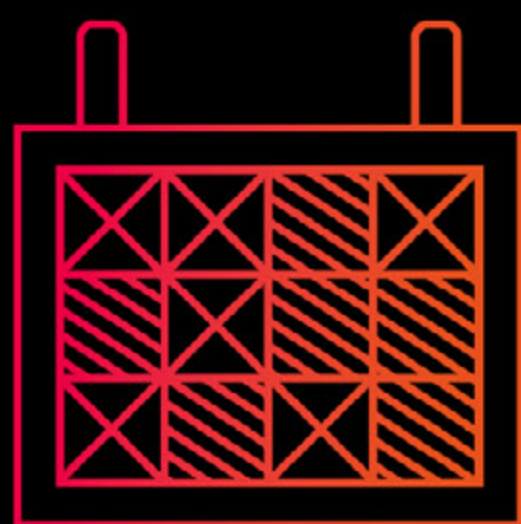

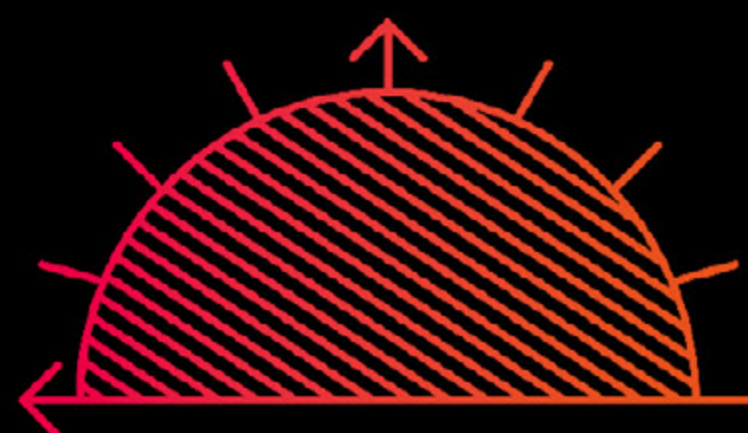

Case Studies

Dan Murray

Former Club: Wolverhampton Wanderers

Now: BSc (Hons) Physiotherapy Student



"Obviously I still had aspirations to be a footballer but then it was always in my mind that being a physio was a good job that I'd be interested in."

When Dan Murray was sat on the treatment table at Wolverhampton Wanderers he could not have imagined that it would lead directly down another path.

As a young player, football is all about being given breaks. Opportunities to impress and develop and show that you merit a professional contract.

So for midfielder Dan, who moved out of his family home in Stockport to live in digs in the Black Country, a broken leg and long period of rehabilitation was exactly the sort of impediment that every youngster fears.

While five of his peers signed professional deals at Molineux, a decision was delayed on Murray. Hope remained temporarily but he had lost too much ground and was eventually released.

Three years on, none of Murray's five former teammates remain at Wolves. However, his experiences at the club did spark an interest in another area and he is now midway through a BSc (Hons) in Physiotherapy at Salford University.

"I spent close to a year with the physios and it was just picking things up and looking at everyone else's injuries that caught my interest. I got talking to the physios and it just triggered from there," he said.

"You need that other interest because if you have a bad day at football it can take your mind off it. Obviously I still had aspirations to be a footballer but then it was always in my mind that being a physio was a good job that I'd be interested in."

The course at Salford is one that proves popular with footballers due to its long established link with the Professional Footballers' Association.

Last summer's graduates included the former West Bromwich Albion and QPR striker Rob Hulse and one-time Manchester City and Burnley left-back Stephen Jordan.

Murray, who did an A Level in Biology ahead of joining the student ranks, stressed that while it has been an academic "step-up", many of the traits he identified with professional football have enabled him to settle quickly and enjoy his new surroundings.

"There probably is a gap between the education programme at Wolves and coming to University but if you're willing to put your mind to it and work hard you can bridge that quite easily," he added. "It's one of those subjects where you think, 'I'm going to have to treat patients in the future', it's really important that I don't just scrape through but aim to be the best physio possible."

"I've made some great friends here. At football everything is quite competitive, there is a certain self-interest battling for a professional contract.

But this is a nice environment to come into.

You're pitched together with other students, people are prepared to stay behind and help each other, you're working together for the same thing, we do a lot of group work, we go out socially and it's a really nice vibe.

"I started doing this from a sporting background, thinking treating ankle and knee injuries is what physiotherapy is about and then you learn about other things, particularly on placements to hospitals. I recently had to give a 30-minute talk to 20 members of NHS staff on frailty which is something from a sporting interest I'd had not much interest in but when you're in a hospital it's different and it changed my perspective."

Case Studies

Joel Bonner

Former Club: Shrewsbury Town

Now: Loughborough University - Sport and Exercise Psychology

The 22-year-old was part of Liverpool's academy as a schoolboy, playing alongside current first-team superstar Trent Alexander-Arnold, until he was released at the age of 16.

And while Bonner's dream of playing for his boyhood club did not materialise, the former Shrewsbury Town apprentice rejoined the reigning Premier League champions in a different capacity in November, working as an Under-16s Analyst and Individual Coach.

The Merseysider's rapid progression into full-time employment has been facilitated by his decision to study Sport and Exercise Psychology at Loughborough University. Bonner secured a year-long placement opportunity at Manchester United in July 2019, which gave him the chance to develop many skills in a working environment, while also bolstering his CV.

"I worked with the academy department, mostly with the Under-12s to Under-16s, helping to deliver the educational aspect of psychology, teaching the lads about a variety of different components, like motivation, goal setting and self-reflection," he continued."

Bonner will now complete his degree course in 2022, in order to accommodate his additional work commitments.

Reflecting on his transition from football apprentice to university student, the centre-back believes he was well prepared thanks to the help of staff at Shrewsbury and LFE.

“The apprenticeship is well designed in terms of encouraging us to balance education alongside football,” he said. “The opportunity to go to university was something that excited me, and I received plenty of help with submitting my UCAS application, which meant it wasn’t such a stressful situation when I did get released.

There is a lot of support available to every apprentice, but you’ve also got to take ownership of your own pathway. The information I received was the catalyst for me to then research my options in depth. Being proactive and taking the initiative to sort out your own future is very important.

“The lure of Loughborough is the sporting pedigree. They have a full-time football programme that you can be involved with alongside studying your degree, and that’s something I was already well prepared for having been an apprentice.”

Several former academy players earn places at Loughborough every year, studying a range of different subjects, while contributing to their substantial games programme, which includes fixtures in the BUCS League and Step 5 of Non-League, entry into the FA Cup, FA Vase and a handful of County Cups, as well as profile friendlies against Category One academies.

Bonner, who shared his insight as a speaker on a Premier League Academy Player Support webinar for Under-16 players and parents a few months ago, believes that apprentices are well suited to pursuing the higher education route.

He said: “University is an experience that’s not just about studying for a degree. It’s living away from home and learning life skills, meeting new people and socialising with different cultures, trying new experiences and finding new interests, plus there is a football aspect to it as well.

There are essential life skills that you learn at university that have certainly helped me develop as a person. It’s important to consider it as an all-round experience and a wider package than just solely studying a degree.”

Case Studies

Tyler Guy

Former Club: Notts County

Now: Graduate in Law



"From working in a club and in the industry on a daily basis you begin to understand that there are so many things going on around football and sport in the UK."

Tyler Guy may not have ventured far since leaving Meadow Lane in the summer of 2013, but he has already covered significant ground on his journey towards a new career.

The former Notts County defender is now in his fourth year at Nottingham Trent University, which is located less than a couple of miles away from the club he served as an apprentice.

After graduating with an Upper Second-Class Honours (2:1) degree in Law in the summer, Guy turned his attention to the next phase of his training to become a solicitor and embarked on a postgraduate, Legal Practice Course.

This covers topics like Taxation, Accounting and Litigation while enhancing skills developed on his degree in areas like drafting documentation, advocacy and interviewing to support his next career goal.

"I'm looking to pursue a career as a solicitor specialising in Sports Law," Guy told LFE. "When I was playing football that was the goal. That was all that was initially in my mind but when I started the second year of my apprenticeship I decided that I would apply for university."

"I've always been really interested in the legal side of Sport and it's a growing area with intermediaries, player's contracts and the finance now in football."

Case Studies

“When I first started playing football I was under the impression that a club consisted of the manager, coaches and playing staff and that was it. From working in a club and in the industry on a daily basis you begin to understand that there are so many things going on around football and sport in the UK.

“It opened my eyes to think that there are loads more things that I can do in Sport apart from playing.

“A lot of lads in football think they are going to be footballers so why plan for anything else but I thought it was important to have another avenue.

“It’s not to say I wasn’t fully focused on football but it was good to keep my options open.

“I can’t begin to explain how quickly three years has gone. I’m in my fourth year at university and it seems two minutes since I was starting a scholarship.

“Everyone is in the same boat when you get to university. You fit in straight away. It’s a week of getting to know everyone and then off you go.”

Thriving on the student lifestyle and social life that surrounds Higher Education, Guy has nevertheless also admitted that he has been pleasantly surprised by the standard and level of interest in university football.

“My football experience got better when I came to university,” he added.

“It’s a really solid level of football and there are a lot of lads in the same position as me who have been at professional clubs.

“I had the best football experience I’ve ever had playing in the Varsity match against the University of Nottingham in front of a crowd of around 6,000 people at the end of the year. It was amazing.”

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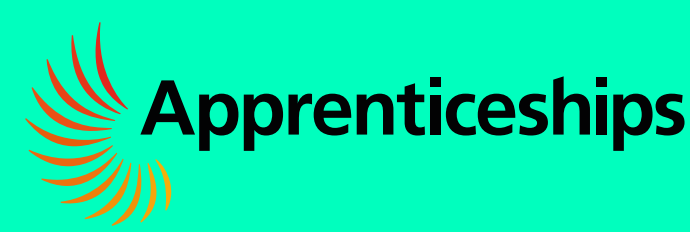
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
